Road Snow Removal

The City has contracted for snow removal during the winter season. The contractor will be plowing the snow, and applying salt or melting chemicals on the roads.

We need the cooperation of all residents to move your vehicles from the streets to your driveways to allow the contractor to make a clean sweep of the roadway. This will improve the contractor's ability to clear the roads and make them safe for everyone.



Sidewalk Snow and Debris Removal

Residents are responsible for clearing the sidewalks in front of their property of hazardous materials, including snow, ice, mud and other debris (refer to Metro Ordinance 156.052). Snow and ice are to be removed within 24 hours after such snow/ice fall (refer to Metro Ordinance 97.113). This is to reduce the risk of falls and subsequent injury by pedestrians.

Halloween Parade

Kingsley's annual Halloween Parade was on October 29th at 7:00 pm. As in the past, we met all of the little trick or treaters and their parents at the flagpole in the Kingsley Green. This year Valerie Andres and Della Peron graciously donated their time and effort by collecting and bagging the candy, and creating a fun and safe environment for our parade. Thanks so much to all of the participating families.

Sidewalk Replacement

It is the resident's responsibility to properly maintain the sidewalks in front of their house (refer to Metro Ordinance 156.052). The City has contracted with M.A. Bisig to replace sidewalks that present tripping hazards in the neighborhood as a courtesy to residents to improve the walkable nature of the City for adults and children. In addition, we will be installing tactile warning strips at all sidewalks that abut newly paved roads. As a reminder, please do not apply de-icing salts to concrete less than one year old.

City Picnic

The City Picnic was held on September 10th. This was Lesa Ferguson's first planning of this event and she did a fantastic job. Thank you Lesa and everyone who helped organize. Thank you to Mainsource Bank and Republic Bank for their donations and attendance. Also, thank you to Seneca Animal Hospital, Kentucky Derby Museum, Belle of Louisville, and the Louisville Zoo for their donations.

Construction Permits

A reminder that construction permits and a pre-construction inspection to inspect public sidewalks and public easements is required before a property owner may construct any modification or improvement to their existing property, including a driveway or a deck. The Owner must file the necessary permits and submit a \$300.00 deposit and a \$10 check, both payable to the City. Refer to the City webpage for additional information.

Call 811 Before You Dig!

Why? It sounds innocent enough to dig a hole to plant a tree or do other construction improvements but if you or a contractor accidentally cut an underground service wire, it could end up costing you thousands of dollars. Additionally Kentucky State Law requires residents and contractors to Call Before You Dig. Don't guess – call 811.

Street Parking and Roadway Congestion: Everyone who lives in Kingsley knows that a drive down Tyler Lane can sometimes involve a lot of weaving around parked cars, especially during rush hour. The periodic congestion owes in large part to the traffic lights at Bardstown Road and Taylorsville Road, which unavoidably makes for heavy usage of Tyler Lane.

Family circumstances often make street parking a necessity. However, if and when parking on any of our streets can be avoided, Kingsley drivers (especially those who use Tyler Lane) will enjoy and appreciate the opportunity to more easily navigate the neighborhood. While residents have the right to park on the street, we ask only that everyone be mindful of the consequences to traffic flow when a large number of cars are parked along the roadway. Also, please take what precautions you can when parking on the street to insure that your immediate neighbors can safely and easily enter and exit their driveways.

City of Kingsley Website: There is a wealth of information available and it provides a method of quickly asking questions and getting a quick response . Emails received via the City web site are reviewed daily and routed to the correct individual for a response. The City web site has links to the Commissioner Meeting Minutes and an electronic version of the News Letters. We would also encourage you to check the City’s Facebook page.

Google Fiber Update: The Google Fiber budget for expansion in 2018 has already been set. Google Fiber will be beginning a discussion regarding the installation methodology to be used within individual home rule cities. The current micro trenching method in roadways has encountered some issues.
